March Luncheon Meeting Relevant to Members

A very informative luncheon meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 15th, at the Hee Hing Restaurant in Kapahulu. In addition to a delicious Chinese lunch, there will be a representative there from the Alzheimer's Association to enlighten us and answer our questions.

Ronald Reagan had the misfortune of bringing the ailment of Alzheimer's to national prominence and awareness. Unfortunately, it is much too prevalent. Many of us know of a friend or relative that has been stricken with this protracted, debilitating condition. It is really much more of an ordeal for the caregivers.

Our speaker is Janet Eli, President and CEO of the Alzheimer's Association, Aloha Chapter, for the past 10 years. She has traveled extensively throughout the Pacific (U.S. Associated Pacific Islands and New Zealand) conducting grant-writing training for indigenous peoples, and continues to offer the training free to low-income, minority and rural communities in Hawaii. She is one of the instructors of Caregiver University and has served on the Aloha United Way Speakers Bureau for the past 12 years.

Veterans' Cemeteries

Presentations by two speakers at the recent Army Retiree Council Meeting were Mr Calvin Matsumoto from the National Cemetery of the Pacific-Punchbowl and Mr. Miles Okamura from the State Veterans Cemetery-Kaneohe. The speakers noted that the Veterans Cemeteries in Hawaii are operated by the Federal (VA), Army, State, City and County governments.

Mr. Calvin Matsumoto, National Cemetery of the Pacific-Punchbowl noted that the cemetery has not been able to provide ground/casket burial since 1991. The current planned columbarium niches are expected to reach its capacity in about four years. A gravesite is not reserved before it is needed for a burial. VA honors reservations made through 1962, when the cemetery was under the jurisdiction of the Department of the Army and reservations were allowed. **See Cemeteries, Page 4**

Janet will present an overview of Alzheimer's disease, when memory loss is treatable and reversible, how to identify if the signs are normal aging or if it's time to talk with your doctor, programs and services provided by the Alzheimer's Association and helpful practical tips to improve memory.

Merrie Ladies Tour JABSOM

The *Merrie Ladies* group met at the University of Hawaii John A. Burns School of Medicine (JABSOM) Kakaako campus on Monday, February 12th. Greg Takeyama (former KHON newscaster) was our tour guide and we learned first hand what a world class facility we have here in Hawaii. Some facts about JABSOM:

1. The UH School of Medicine was established in 1967 as a two-year program but became a four-year degree granting program in 1973.
2. The school has trained more than 1,800 physicians - more than half of the doctors in our state.
3. It is a national leader in gender equity as the top U.S. medical school in percentage of women (7 of 15) serving as department chairpersons.
4. In 2007, the school received 1,900 applications seeking to fill the 62 available students' slots.
5. JABSOM is looking for volunteers to be part of their Standardized Patient Program. These volunteers are trained to portray patients with medical complaints or concerns. Students examine these patients in either a testing situation or as a learning experience.

The 21 participants gave Greg a standing ovation for the very educational tour. Next, we enjoyed lunch in the school cafeteria with food prepared by the Culinary Arts Department, Kapiolani Community College. We thank Charlene Towne for setting up this great activity. Know Your Benefits!

According to *Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents*, 2006 edition, VA Pamphlet 80-06-01, eligibility for most VA benefits is based upon discharge from action military service under other than dishonorable conditions. Active service means full-time service, other than active duty for training in any military branch.

Health care: For most veterans, entry into the VA health care system begins by applying for enrollment (by completing VA Form 10-10EZ – available at the Spark Matsunaga VA Medical Center, Tripler Army Hospital or calling 1-877-222-8387) There are exceptions for the necessity of enrollment. →Pg 4

Service connected disability: Disability compensation may be available to veterans who are disabled by injury or disease that was incurred or aggravated during active military service. Are you Vietnam veteran exposed to Agent Orange? There are eleven diseases that are presumed by VA to be service connected – diabetes type 2 is one, along with soft-tissue sarcoma and respiratory cancers, to name a few more.

Education and Training: Eligibility usually expires 10 years after discharge.

Home Loan Guaranty: VA home loan guaranties are issued to help eligible service members, veteran, reservists and unmarried surviving spouses to obtain homes, condominiums and to refinance loans. Visit <http://www.homeloans.va.gov>.

Cemeteries — from first page

Mr. Matsumoto went on to explain that exceptions have been made for other than spouses and more than two persons to be placed in a gravesite or columbarium niche. These include children, relatives, etc. There is no charge for burial in a National Cemetery. There is a site set aside for the scattering of ashes.

Mr. Miles Okamura, Cemetery Operations Manager, Hawaii State Veterans Cemetery, Office of Veterans Services, described the Hawaii Veterans Cemetery-Kaneohe as a State Funded Cemetery for Veterans. There is a \$300 burial/inurnment fee that spouses/dependents pay and cost for the veteran is covered by the VA. Casket burials now require Polyguard Burial Vault at a cost of \$220 for family members and no charge for the Retiree, Veteran or Active Duty personnel. The vaults were required to prevent the burial site from settling and collapsing following the burial.

Mr. Okamura noted there are 75,000 burial sites remaining in Kaneohe and sufficient columbarium niches for a period of four or five years. For those whose ashes have been scattered, an area has been set aside for memorial remembrance/plaques to be displayed. Pets are not allowed to be buried in the Hawaii State Veterans Cemetery.

At the time of need, the funeral director or family shall contact the National, Army, State or City/County Veterans Cemetery to schedule the interment. The same procedure is followed if the veteran's eligible spouse or dependent predeceases the veteran.

Funeral Services are not held at the National or State Veterans cemetery, but a final committal service may be held at the cemetery.

Legislative Affairs

The following bills are now under consideration at the Hawaii State Legislature:

SB 31/HB 831 Requires Office of Veterans' services to pay directly to a mortuary for services and to transport the remains of a deceased veteran who joined the New Filipino Scouts between 10/6/1945, and 6/30/1947, and died after

6/30/1994, to the Philippines upon submission of an unpaid invoice.

SB 699 Authorizes counties to waive the fees for special number license plates to veterans.

SB 733 Appropriates funds to the Department of Defense for veterans' newsletters to inform returning veterans of benefit changes and the availability of supportive services and programs.

SB 806 Establishes a permanent Clerk Typist II position in the Office of Veterans Services on Oahu. Makes appropriation in FY 2007-2008 for a travel allowance for the counselor position.

HB 613 Changes and clarifies the composition of the policy advisory board on veterans' services.

HB 1065 Appropriates funds for the maintenance of state veterans cemeteries statewide, including the purchase of casket liners to help remedy the soil problems at the cemeteries.

Aloha Chapter strongly supports the re-nomination of our member, MG Robert G.F. Lee, as State Adjutant General for another term. Accordingly, **Les Ihara**, our President/Chairman of the Board, submitted a letter stating that to the legislature.



For this issue of Na Leo O Na Koa we are beginning profiles, space permitting, of prominent members of Aloha Chapter. Our first member profile is LTG Allen K. Ono.



Lieutenant General Allen Kenji Ono, USA, Ret., was born in Honolulu. He served in the Army for 35 years and was the first Asian American three-star general in the U. S. Armed Forces.

He attended public schools in Hawaii and was commissioned an infantry officer through the University of Hawaii ROTC program. His Army career included assignments at numerous Mainland posts, Korea, Vietnam, Europe, and Panama. His final Army position was as the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel, responsible for human resources policy for the entire Army. His military decorations include two Army Distinguished Service Medals, Legion of Merit Medal, and two Bronze Star Medals. Upon retirement from the Army, he returned to Hawaii to begin another career as executive vice president and a member of the Board of Directors at American Savings Bank.

For his listing in Who's Who in America, LTG Ono wrote, "Values transcend international borders, skin color, and shape of eyes. I was given the opportunity to serve the nation in the Army, guided by values of my immigrant parents from Japan and my youth in Hawaii. These values have held unchanged and steadfast and brought me to full life." The gallant Japanese American soldiers of World War II were his personal role models and heroes after whom he patterned his military and civilian careers. LTG Ono said, "I was completely and consistently aware that I am a Japanese American. It meant that I worked harder, moved quicker and, by habit, critiqued my actions repeatedly from every perspective. I had a focused and fierce drive to build a reputation of professional competence and high personal integrity with no blemish of shame on my family and heritage."

He and his wife, Evelyn, now live in Makiki and have two children, Dr. Craig Ono, an orthopedic surgeon and commander of the Army Reserve Medical Command in Hawaii, and Dr. Curtis Ono, an optometrist in Seattle.

SBP SSA OFFSET UPDATE

April 1st will mark another step in the phase out of the reduction of Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) annuity for annuitants age 62 and older. Originally, annuitants received 55% of the base amount selected (usually, but not always, the retired pay amount) until age 62 when the benefit was reduced to 35% of the base amount as eligibility for Social Security began. Congress changed the law to eliminate this reduction and to phase in the increase at 5% increments.

The final increase will take place 1 APR 08, when all SBP annuitants will receive 55% of the base amount elected, regardless of age. The actual payment increase won't be seen until May 1st.
