## CHAPTER MEMBER JIM KELLY APPOINTED TO SENIOR STATE DEPARTMENT POSITION

On May 1st, one of our Chapter members, Mr. James A. Kelly was sworn in as the Assistant Secretary of State for East Asian and Pacific Affairs.

Chapter member U.S. Senator Dan Inouye introduced Mr. Kelly to the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee and stated: "Mr. Kelly has extensive experience dealing with issues facing East Asia and the Pacific from both the public and private sectors. He served in previous administrations for six years as Special Assistant for National Security Affairs, Senior Director for Asian affairs and Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Affairs. As the President of the Pacific Forum, Center for Strategic and International Studies, he has analyzed and led dialogue on Asia-Pacific political, economic and security issues for the past six years.

Chapter member Admiral Joe Vasey, the founder of the

Pacific Forum praised Mr. Kelly as being preeminently qualified for the challenge and feels that the Administration could not have picked a better man for the job. Vasey said: "he

is very akamai on Asia and has developed relationships over the years with the top diplomats, business leaders and key government officials in

Asia, that will serve U.S. interests very well."

Mr. Kelly is a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, Harvard University Graduate School of Business Administration and the national War College. He retired in 1982 as a Supply Corps Captain, U. S. Navy and commanded the Naval Supply Depot at Pearl Harbor. Secretary Kelly and his artist wife, Audrey have enjoyed living in Honolulu for many years and call Hawaii home.

He has been on the move in his first month in office, visiting China, Japan, South Korea, Thailand, Singapore and Australia to rally Asian support for the Missile Defense Plan. Part of his dialogue with China is to allay concerns they have expressed about our missile system plan.

Major General Butch Correa was appointed The Adjutant General, State of Hawaii, Department of Defense, effective December 31, 1999. He is the Director of State Civil Defense, provides direct support to the Office of Veterans Services and is co-chair of the State Steering Committee that orchestrates the 50th Anniversary Commemoration of the Korean War (2000-2003).

Since joining the Guard in 1966, he has served in various positions including Commanding General of the 29th Separate Infantry Brigade; Commander of the 103rd Troop Command, Commander of Task Force Iniki, Kauai, and Commanding



General, Hawaii Army National Guard.

General Correa's civilian career includes service as supervising deputy attorney general, State of Hawaii, and as a member and chairman of the Labor & Industrial Relations Appeals Board.

Butch earned his bachelor of science degree and a juris doctorate degree from the University of Hawaii. His military education includes the US Army Armor Officer Candidate School, Infantry Officer Advanced Course, NBC Course, Command & General Staff College and US Army War College.

General Correa and his wife, JoJo, have three sons, Edward III, John, and Michael; and, daughters, Angela and Mary. They reside in Honolulu, Oahu.

### Memorial Day 2001

On Memorial Day, Monday, May 28, Ralph Hiatt presented a wreath at Punchbowl and a lei at Kaneohe on behalf of TROA Hawaii Chapter honoring all our veterans who gave the ultimate sacrifice. Hank Heyenga also attended both ceremonies with the TROA Flag. Dick Vercauteren assisted Ralph at Punchbowl. We also presented a wreath at the Arizona Memorial and attended the ceremony at Schofield Barracks.

### CPI Correction Will Provide Small COLA "Catch-Up"

The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) is reissuing Consumer Price Index (CPI) data for the January to August 2000 period to correct an error recently uncovered in software used to calculate the index. The CPI increase of approximately 0.1% will increase cost of living adjustments (COLA) in Social Security, military retired pay and other benefits adjusted annually by CPI data. BLS officials estimate that adjustment checks, small as they may be, will be issued in the latter part of this year.

### Training is Declared Most Important

While family time, deployments and other well-being or quality of life issues are important, National Guard soldiers say training is more important. In a recent nationwide survey of Army National Guard soldiers, approximately 66% of the over 5700 responses indicated professional training was their biggest concern. Here again is another "loud and clear" statement for the immediate resumption of live fire training at Makua Valley. The Guard is affected by the court delays as much as the 25th Infantry. Let's hope the judge acts swiftly and positively in the Army's favor.

### US Army Women's Museum

The US Army Women's Museum has moved from Fort McClellan, AL to Fort Lee, VA. A dedication ceremony was held on May 11, 2001.

### Concurrent Receipt

Despite setbacks in budget negotiations, support is strong and efforts continue on this issue authorizing concurrent receipt of military retired pay and veterans' disability compensation. TROA is looking to include concurrent receipt language in the FY 02 Defense Authorization Bill. Rep. Michael Bilirakis' (R-FL) bill, H.R. 303, which would allow full funding for concurrent receipt, has 334 cosponsors. Sen. Harry Reid (Nev.) has introduced a similar bill, S. 170, which now has 58 cosponsors. In what may be signs of an increase in the volume of debate over concurrent receipt, NBC News with Tom Brokaw recently aired a report on the issue.

### Veterans Commemorative Stamp Unveiled

On 23 May, on the National Mall in the shadow of the Capitol, the U.S. Postal Service issued the new Honoring Veterans Commemorative Stamp. These stamps are available in post offices in Hawaii.

### Tenfold Hike Asked for Troops to Teachers

The Administration, and Mrs. Laura Bush in particular, are promoting the Troops to Teacher Program. President Bush has requested a jump in funding from \$3 million to \$30 million for the Troops to Teachers program next year. The program is run by the Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support. It provides referral assistance and placement services to military personnel interested in becoming teachers after their service. The program would pay participants up to \$5,000 to help cover the costs of a teacher certification program, White House officials said. Some participants also would receive a \$10,000 bonus if they accept jobs in "high-needs" school districts, such as in inner-city schools and certain rural areas.

**Lieutenant Colonel Stu Stabley USAF—19 February 1921— 1 June 2001**  
**Fighter Pilot — Author — Historian—Archivist—Family Man and Friend**

Stewart S. Stabley graduated from the United States Military Academy, West Point, New York on June 5, 1945.

After getting his feet wet in the P-40, P-51, P47, F-80 and F-84, 1 /LT. Stabley managed to get assigned to the 81st Fighter Group (Jet) in 1949 when they were transitioning to the F-86A. He spent the next five years with the 81st: from Albuquerque, New Mexico to Moses Lake, Washington and as a pilot during the North Atlantic crossing, Fox Able-9, to England. He accumulated 2,300 hours in the F-86 models.

While with the 81st in England Capt. Stabley volunteered for a three



month temporary duty tour in Korea where he flew thirty combat missions as a Flight Leader in the F-86E with the 25th Squadron of the 51st Fighter Group.

Stu served in the WW II Occupation of Germany, aerial combat in Korea and as the Commander of a Tactical Air Operations Center in South East Asia during the Viet Nam war.

In 1968, Stu chose to retire in Hawaii after three years as a Contingency War planning officer in Headquarters Pacific Air Forces. He is survived by his wife Nancy of 53 years, two children Sue Ann and Gordon, and five grand -children.

## HAWAII CHAPTER JROTC/ROTC ACTIVITIES: 2001

Between the dates 20 April and 23 May, 2001, thirteen Hawaii Chapter members presented medals and certificates to nineteen JROTC high school cadets on the island of Oahu. Four were to Air Force, eleven Army, three Navy, and one Marine Corps cadet selected by their instructors and peers as outstanding individuals.

## TRIPLER HEALTH CONSUMER COMMITTEE REPORT

The Tripler Consumers Affairs Committee met on 25 April 2001. There will be a tri-service refill pharmacy at the new Pearl Harbor Naval Exchange facility, currently under construction. There are continuing meetings between the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), DOD and VA. The purpose is to set up a genuine partnership of cooperation between the three health care systems, for patients to move smoothly between the various components of the health care provider system. There are no plans to force an eligible patient to have to choose a single system for health care. These meetings are continuing, but the difficulty is getting firm decisions on planning options, as a number of key appointees in the current administration have not been confirmed. Long term care is a major problem also under discussion. The TRICARE Senior Pharmacy is operating smoothly with over a million prescriptions already filled nationally. This new system has actually increased the use of the Tripler pharmacy. Beneficiaries are encouraged to try the Na-

tional Mail Order Pharmacy option for the convenience of ordering from your home and having your prescriptions delivered to you. The DOD health care system is seriously underfunded at this time, specially in the pharmacy area. (It is to our direct benefit to answer the calls from TROA, NAUS and other military associations in contacting the Bush administration and Congress to provide supplemental health funding, needed this fiscal year and the next.) Effective 1 June 2001 a National Enrollment Data Base (NEDB) will be in effect as the system that will verify our eligibility for health care as DEERs does now. Do not let your dependents ID cards expire, or they will automatically be dropped from the NEDB files and will not be able to access health care. To get them reinstated, you will need to work through your military service personnel ID card issuing agency. Tripler will not be able to do it for you. Tripler is currently supporting a couple military exercises and the Summer turnover of personnel will soon occur. It may be more difficult to access certain clinics due to staff shortages. The next meeting will be on 25 July 2001.

According to a New York Times article by Saul Hansell, there never was such a thing as a free lunch over the Internet. But for a while a determined freeloader could find a Web site that would pick up the tab for all sorts of other goods and services, from computer keyboards to photo developing, in return for little more than looking at a few ads. No more. You can't get free online service at freeInternet.com any more. Nor can you get a free computer from free-pc.com or make a phone call at callfreeway.com. Some services are still free, but with limits. Kmart's Bluelight.com offers free Internet service — but for only 12 hours a month. At other sites, the watchword has changed from free to fee. What had been free picture developing at Snapfish.com now costs \$1.99 a roll. Voicemail from uReach is at least \$2.99 a month. And the only thing free at Freemerchant.com, which once gave Internet stores to small business, is a 30-day trial of its \$25 a month service.

In Hawaii, about the only free ISP is still Juno, but with free goes a lot of on-screen advertising and if you plan to spend lots of time online, be prepared to get bumped...frequently. Actually, I was kind of intrigued by this article, so I did some surfing and guess what...I checked out www.myfree.com and found they have a database of over 3200 "freebies" Sure, there are some "catches" to a few items, but mostly they are promos to get you to try a product or service and hopefully, become a regular PAYING customer. Anyhow, take a look, it's FREE!

Jim Fromm's e-mail program was great...amazing how much you can do now with e-mail. I knew some of the inner workings but not all by any stretch of the imagination. One aspect of e-mail that comes up regularly is how "private" is it? Well, according to the "experts" it's about as private as a postcard!! Not only does the server of your ISP store copies, but also your messages can be "hijacked" on their way. If you do e-mail at work, your boss can legally peek at them, too!

(Remember the New York Times staffers that got fired for misusing e-mail?) So, if you are concerned with this issue, what's the solution? One way is to send free, encrypted e-mail using a Web-based service such as Hushmail (www.hushmail.com). One catch: The person you are sending to must also use it for the message to be secure. Another very popular one is at www.PGP.com. It's got about 10 million users worldwide and you can download software that works with your existing e-mail account.

Finally, Microsoft has announced the date for release of the new Windows operating system, XP. It's due to hit the stores on October 25<sup>th</sup> and look for this to be the biggest hype since the introduction of Windows 95! According to an insider, they are spending an incredible amount of dollars to market this new OS and in terms of what they did for WIN 95, "that was just a drop in the bucket". So look for some pretty interesting stuff to happen. There are two versions of XP, a home version that is an upgrade of 98/ME and a professional version that upgrades NT/2000. Both are built on NT/2000 code, which makes for better memory protection than earlier editions of Windows and which make XP more crash resistant. (As most of you know, I've been beta testing XP, which was code-named "Whistler" and I have to agree, it's much more crash resistant.)

### Late Breaking News—Veterans' Burial Benefits May Jump

Two bills target veterans' burial benefits for substantial hikes. The Senate's Veterans Burial Benefits Improvement Act would boost the \$1,500 burial benefit for service-connected deaths to \$3,713; the \$300 payment for nonservice-connected deaths to \$1,135, and the \$150 plot allowance to \$670. The Veterans Opportunities Act (passed by the House) would increase the burial benefits to \$2,000 for service-connected deaths and to \$500 for non-service connected. The Plot allowance would increase to \$300. The next step is for the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee to consider the House Bill.
