USS OHIO SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETES SEA TRIALS

Washington, D.C. -- USS OHIO (SSGN 726), the Navy's first modern guided missile submarine, took a significant step towards rejoining the Fleet on 19 December 2005, when it arrived at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, WA.

"SSGNs will provide us with one of the most capable and versatile strike options in the Navy," said RADM William Hilarides, Program Executive Officer for Submarines. "We are eager to have OHIO and her sister ships rejoin the Fleet."

OHIO is the first of four fleet ballistic missile submarines (SSBNs) to be converted into SSGNs. Prior to the conversion process, each boat unloaded its complement of Trident Submarine Launched Ballistic Missiles. Twenty-two of the twenty-four missile tubes on each boat are being retrofitted to carry up to seven TOMAHAWK cruise missiles, for a maximum load out of 154 missiles per boat. The remaining two tubes are being converted into lock-in/ lock-out



chambers for use by Special Operations Forces (SOF). Each SSGN will be able to carry and support up to 66 Special Operation Forces for an extended period of time. These ships will have a specialized planning area, physical fitness equipment, and laser shooting ranges for use by the Operators.

Further, SSGNs will be able to carry two Advanced SEAL Delivery Systems, two Dry deck Shelters, or one of each using the lock-in/lock-out chambers as their docking sites.

"The ability to carry a large Special Operations Force, coupled with its

TOMAHAWK strike capability and inherent stealth characteristics make SSGN a unique and powerful platform for combatant commanders to carry out a variety of missions," said CAPT David Norris, SSGN Program Manager (PMS 398).

In addition to the strike capabilities of SSGNs, the submarines will also have improved Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance equipment, enhancing their ability to carry out clandestine operations.

Due to its size and layout, SSGNs offer expanded living and training space for embarked SOF. This space includes increased bunk capacity as well as improved training and physical conditioning areas that allow the SOF operators to maintain their high operating capacity.

The other submarines undergoing the SSGN conversion process - USS MICHIGAN (SSGN 727), FLORIDA (SSGN 728), and GEORGIA (SSGN 729) - are all slated to rejoin the Fleet by 2007.

NEED VOLUNTEERS

- Red Cross Orientation (3 hours). Call 433-6631 to make a reservation.
- Tripler Newcomer's Orientation (3 hours). Held the first Thursday of each month at 0800 in the Kyser Auditorium on the first floor (Ocean Side). One must register with the Red Cross for this orientation.
- Immunization Clearance (1 hour). This clearance is done through the Occupational Health Clinic at Tripler. Hours are from 1300 to 1430 every day of the week except Thursday and weekends.

Office of the Secretary of Defense Submits Budget Paid for by Retirees

The Department of Defense is proposing large hikes in health care fees for military retirees - increases of more than \$1,000 per year in some cases - on the basis that military coverage is "very rich" compared to civilian plans. Retail pharmacy co-pays would be increased by 67% for all beneficiaries, including active duty/Guard/Reserve families. Currently serving members who spend a career in the military stand to lose the most on this issue, because they would pay more years of increased fees than any other group - despite the extraordinary personal and family sacrifices they're already enduring for our country.

The main problem is that Dr. David S. C. Chu, Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness, has never understood that his job is to support the personnel of the military and not balance the budget by decimating benefits. This same philosophy appears to be contagious as it extends today to the Joint Chiefs who are supporting this huge increase in fees and co-payments.

Hawaii Chapter MOAA has about 70 retired members who are not yet 65 years old and TRICARE eligible who will feel the brunt of the increase in health care fees. While a small increase may be warranted, as everyone is experiencing the increase in health care costs, an increase of the magnitude proposed by this administration is not justified.

MOAA is currently working with the responsible congressional committees to prevent or reduce these increases in fees and co-payments from becoming law; however, the support of every member of MOAA is needed to prevent these increases from passing in the congress. The contact data for the Hawaii congressional delegation is contained on page 36 of the 2006 Hawaii Chapter MOAA Directory. Please contact your senator and representative and solicit their vote against these increases.

The Tax Season is Upon Us

Hawaii Chapter MOAA has two members that volunteer their time as tax preparers. Jerry Lesperance works with AARP and George Sullivan works with the Navy at Pearl Harbor. Both services provide free tax preparation and filing. Should anyone wish an appointment they may contact Jerry by e-mail at jlesperance@hawaii.rr.com. George may be contacted by phone at 623-2243.

In addition each of the military services provides a free tax preparation service. The preparers are all volunteers and are capable of doing simple to moderately complex returns. This service is offered at Schofield, Hickam, Pearl Harbor and Kaneohe. You can check at the base for the office location. The site at Pearl Harbor is located in the College building on the Sub base. You may call for an appointment at 473-4112.

Either Jerry or George will be happy to help Hawaii Chapter MOAA members with their taxes particularly if they are house bound.

A Must See - FREE - at the Honolulu Art Academy

Captain James Cook would enjoy seeing his "treasures" on display at the Honolulu Art Academy. This is a "once in a life time" chance, to see artifacts not only that go back 200 to 250 years, but are amazingly all in pristine condition. Collected by Cook on his voyages between 1768/1779, this 350 piece collection has been stored at the Georg-August University in Gottingen, Germany under climate controlled conditions. It has never before been shown as an exhibit.

Tonga is well represented with over half of the pieces coming from that Island Kingdom. Tahiti is next. There are also 35 pieces that come from Cook's stop in Hawaii. There is a large selection of cloth, some colorful, some with intricate designs, but also there are many carved pieces from a large assortment of fishhooks to necklaces, breastplates and the like.

All told it is an enjoyable trip through 18th century history in the South Pacific. The exhibit will be on display at the Art Academy through May 14. It is worth spending a hour or two and it's free.

PERSONAL AFFAIRS

The TRICARE Hawaii Regional Beneficiary Advisory Council/Health Consumer Committee convened 25 January 2006 at Tripler Army Medical Center. The following issues were discussed:

- 1) A checklist outlining steps to prepare for a possible pandemic influenza outbreak was distributed to Committee members. Although the annual flu shot is 80% effective against the Influenza A virus, which kills 36,000 people a year, it is not an effective vaccine against the Avian flu H5N1 virus. If an Avian flu epidemic does occur, such measures as frequent hand washing (always a good idea), using commercially available surgical masks, and exercising respiratory etiquette, to reduce the transmission of infected droplets, will go a long way. Stocking up on non-perishable foods, as a precaution, is also advised. No human to human transmission of the Avian flu virus is known to have occurred so far. For more information on this subject, you can go online at www.cdc.gov/flu, or call the CDC (Center for Disease Control) at 1-800-CDC-INFO.
- 2) Trolley service from Tripler's parking lots continues to be expanded and updated to assist those who need it.
- 3) Continued cosmetic renovations are ongoing in the Ocean side lobby and information center.
- 4) Tripler's Blood donation program was discussed at length:

YOUR BLOOD IS NEEDED

"There is No Mission More Vital" is the motto of the Armed Services Blood Program, located at Tripler Army Medical Center (433-6148). Your donation can save the life of a military service member who is critically injured in Iraq or Afghanistan. Current blood supplies are only 1/3 of that which the operational tempo requires. Donations are shipped within 10 days for distribution to hospitals within the combat theater of operations. Eighty percent of Army and Marine Corps service members who have served in these combat areas are prohibited from giving blood. Air Force and Navy reserve units in Hawaii are currently donating blood. Please call the Tripler Blood Donor Center at 433-6148 or go on line at www.militaryblood.dod.mil to see if you can donate blood and save a life. There is no upper age restriction on those who may give blood. Certain guidelines for donating blood differ from those of the Hawaii Blood Bank. Please mention you are a member of the Hawaii Chapter of MOAA when you call to inquire.

TUG by Colonel Lou Torraca, USAF (Retired)



For those who missed my show and tell last month, I have put it all down in writing for your enjoyment. To recap, I went to the Consumer Electronics Show (CES) in Las Vegas in January and found some interesting stuff I wanted to share with you.

As you can imagine, seeing anywhere near all the 2,500 exhibits at CES is a pretty much impossible expectation so, I had to decide what to try and spend my time on. One of the more valuable, independently sponsored approaches to this problem is Showstoppers, a media event, where a limited number of exhibitors show off their products on the first night of the show. Companies like Sony, Intel, HP, Microsoft, Xerox, Best Buy, Logitech, Zone Labs -- and the innovative companies that launch new products, new services, and new companies themselves are there...this year, it was held at the Wynn, an experience in itself. My hat's off to the folks who work very hard

to make Showstoppers a smashing success, they do a fantastic job! With a much smaller number (around 100) of exhibits, I was able to spend some time talking to and learning from the people who were there to show off their products. After a quick walk-around to see who and what was there, I decided to spend some time with the folks at Digital Innovations, a company with a huge range of products. For this event, they were featuring their security line, a set of items I found to be exceptional as well as extremely useful.

- The first is a Secure Force Wireless Separation Sensor which protects all of your valuable electronics from theft! It prevents you from leaving them behind, which, if you are like me, has happened!! You can attach it easily to your valuables and separation is what triggers an alarm. You'll never leave anything behind, again...guaranteed.
- Next is a retractable Laptop Lock complete with a 4 foot cable that will secure your laptop to immovable objects...and it has a user select 3-digit combination.
- How many of you keep important data on a thumb drive? Is it encrypted? Probably not, which is most likely what inspired the Data Guard USB Thumb drive lock, which keeps your data safe and protects your thumb drive against identity theft. It has a durable metal design and will fit any thumb drive. It also has a user select 3-digit combination.
- A Property Protector Motion-Activated Alarm lets you protect any number of different items by attaching this compact alarm to them. It has a user select 4-digit code which you activate as you put an item down temporarily, e.g. a briefcase, while you are filling out a rental car form. If a thief grabs it the alarm goes off.
- Are you surfing when you're supposed to be working? Have a game up when you need to leave to attend a meeting? Looking at vacation locations when it's time to go to lunch? Here is the ideal solution-PC Defender Wireless PC Screen Lock-it automatically hides your desktop when you leave and unlocks it when you return. Of course, it also provides needed security when you are hard at work on a sensitive company project!
- iSpot Wireless Lost Item Locator. This is one everyone in my family wants...misplaced keys, glasses, remotes, purses, cameras, iPods, cats, dogs, kids, you name it, I've lost it at one time or another and this is the ideal way to keep track. It's even color coded for the less detail oriented of us! Attach one of the 4 receivers to anything and use the iSpot to find it, anytime
- Finally, The Security Dr. Media Vault Ultra-Secure Locking case for all Confidential Media! It provides secure storage for digital media, CDs, DVDs memory cards, etc. It also has a user select 3-digit combination and fits inconspicuously in a standard DVD rack.
- Prices range from a low of \$9.99 for the media vault to a high of \$49.99 for the iSpot.

Sticking with the topic of security, I was most impressed with a product that I saw at one of the exhibits in the convention center parking lot which was filled with inflatable structures to provide space for more gee-whiz goodies. If you're worried about the security of your home or small business, but you haven't yet invested in a wired alarm because it's too expensive, you're a renter, or a college student, there is a new system that overcomes all those problems, costs \$199.95 at retail, and is so simple to set up that you can be protected within minutes from the time you take it out of the carton. It's the LaserShield Instant Security System, the first "Plug and Go" system that you can take with you if and when you move.

- The basic product consists of two handsomely designed modules, resembling small, inconspicuous silver bookshelf speakers.
- The first is the Master Alarm Unit, which holds the siren, the dialer and a voice annunciator that will denote the system's status. The Master Alarm Unit also features a highly sophisticated bunch of electronics and software, which allows the user to control LaserShield from a keychain remote or any touch-tone phone anywhere in the world.
- The second element is the Wireless Detection Unit (WDU), which houses the infra-red motion detector and connects wirelessly with the Master Alarm Unit. Each Wireless Detection Unit can protect a room of approximately 1,100 square feet, and as many as a dozen WDU's can be linked to the Master Unit to provide protection for additional rooms, areas, garages, etc. Additional WDU's carry an SRP of \$59.95.
- The setup is simplicity itself. A user just plugs the Master Alarm Unit into power and telephone, plugs the WDU into an electrical outlet, links the units with the touch of a button, and makes a phone call to establish 24/7 monitoring service which is handled by Rapid Response Monitoring Service, one of America's largest and most professional monitoring services.. the process takes less than five minutes.
- Arming is just as easy. LaserShield can be armed and disarmed from the keychain remote or any touch-tone phone. Panic buttons on the two remotes and each of the wireless units provide additional personal security. LaserShield comes with a series of protections against annoying false alarms, including the absence of wires, magnets and contacts which often go bad and trigger false alarms; the lack of keypads, programs and codes to learn; and even a pet shield to keep Pooky (my dog) from triggering an alarm.

I think it's ideal for Island homes where we want to keep our windows open but also want the added protection an alarm like this provides.

LaserShield is expected to be available at major retailers in the first quarter of 2006. It is also currently available at www.Amazon.com. The charge for monthly monitoring is \$19.95.
