
April Event

Emergency Room Visits

If a retired vet receives treatment at a non-VA facility, the vet could now get some of their out-of-pocket costs reimbursed years later, even if their claim was previously denied. The VA's new rule took effect 24 April which covers these past costs and reimburses veterans going forward.

The prior patient will have to file a new claim by 22 February 2924 to get the money. The retroactive reimbursements only apply to VA patients who received emergency room treatments for a non-service connected condition and who also had had health insurance through a third-party insurer.

The VA wull only reimburse coinsurance—defined as the patient's out-of-pocket cost-sharing percentage with their third=party insurer—at non-VA emergency departments and won't reimburse flat-rate copayments or payments towards flat-rate deductibles.

Trivia Answer

For conditions not considered service-connected, VA can also pay for emergency medical care but only under certain conditions: Care must be provided in a hospital emergency department; care must be given to treat life- or health-threatening conditions; the required care must not be available to the veteran at a VA facility and the veteran must have utilized care at the VA within the last two years. In an emergency, the VA says the veteran should go to the "nearest emergency department."

The VA acknowledges that some veterans may never have filed a claim since on or after 1 February 2010 because they knew it would be denied. Now, they can still file a claim until the 22 February 2024 deadline.
