"A Few Appropriate Remarks" - The Gettysburg Address

These words, a "few appropriate remarks" constituted an invitation for a President to consecrate a cemetery. The remarks, when finally made, were short and lasted less

than 2 minutes. The audience was caught off guard by its brevity as the previous speaker spoke for over 2 hours.

The editors of the Chicago Sun-Times newspaper observed that, "the cheek of every American must tingle with shame as regards to the silly, flat, and dish watery utterances of the man who had to be pointed out to intelligent foreigners as the President of the United States". The Harrisburg Patriot and Union newspaper commented that, "we pass over the silly remarks of the President, for the credit of the nation we are willing that the veil of oblivion shall be dropped over them and that they shall no more be repeated or thought of." Even the President himself told his bodyguard, "Lamon, that speech won't scour".

When the President accepted the invitation, he drafted his speech and

gave it to several friends for comment. At the dedication ceremony, he sat patiently while America's greatest orator of the time, Edward Everett, delivered his lengthy speech. At the allotted time, this tall, gaunt man rose up and gave, in 10 sentences and less than 300 words, a speech for the ages. No one would remember what Everett said but the brief speech that followed contained the ideas that are the essence and soul of this country.

On November 19th, 1863, 142 years ago, a man uttered words on the site of a cemetery at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. Four months previously, the fields west, north, and south of this town witnessed the bloodiest three-day battle of a Civil War that pitted American against American.

The words delivered by Abraham Lincoln on that day remain a cornerstone of what America is all about and these words are:

"Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth upon this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war...testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedi-

cated...can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war.

We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate...we cannot consecrate...we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember, what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here.

It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us...that from those honored dead, we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion...that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain...that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom...and that government of the people...by the people...for the people...shall not perish from the earth."

YOUR PRESIDENT'S Perspective

This month we celebrate what is now called "Veterans Day" but as I was growing up it was always "Armistice Day" to celebrate the end of the Great War or World War I on 11 November 1918. Prior to the Great War, or the span between our Civil War and 1914 the start of the Great War, numerous small conflicts occurred where weapons primarily had developed and modernized a great deal, while military tactics remained somewhat the same. Maneuver warfare, as we see it today was employed by the likes of Jeb Stuart or Phil Sheridan in the Civil War and the US Cavalry after that. The infantry still defended behind fixed defensive trenches or fixtures or attacked these defensive positions, many times with the head on assault such as Pickett's charge on July 3, 1863 at Gettysburg. Now with the Great War we see machine guns, barbed wire, heavy breech loading artillery, the airplane, and finally the infantry tank enter the field of battle. New weapons of horrific killing capability should have signaled to someone on either side of the conflict that tactics now also have to change. Man can be obstinate and slow to change as we have seen over our history of the world, but this oversight during the Great War caused unbelievable death and destruction. Here are just a few sobering numbers that occurred in only a four year time frame; DEAD - 1 million British, 1.7 million French, 2 million German, 1.7 million Russians, or in the year groups of 1892-1895, men who were 19 to 22 when the war broke out were reduced by 35 to 37 percent or one in three men were lost from these Countries. No wonder they call this the "Lost Generation". So futile was the "peace settlement" that World War II was spawned from it. Why this piece of history? Just a baseline to understand the importance of remembering those that have served, are serving, or will serve in a uniformed service of our Country. We have seen over and over bumper stickers etc. that "Freedom is not Free", but I believe it is a lot more. A commitment to the American values and ethics that have evolved from the many cultures that makes up our Country's fabric. The realization that this is a constant commitment, not just in time of war or crises, by what we do and how we do it. Having traveled world wide as most of you have, it just "feels good" to walk through the US Customs and Immigration and realize "I am home". So take a moment or two this 11 November and reflect what you have done for our Country (in this group a tremendous amount), but also what can we continue to do to pass on the legacy of America to upcoming generations.

As Americans we should all read these words occasionally to remind ourselves of what we stand for; of why we are prepared to shed blood to preserve our freedoms; of why this country will persevere long after its enemies have died at our ramparts.

If anyone should ask you what America is all about, tell them to read the Gettysburg Address.

(Below is the address in Lincoln’s hand writing.)

Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth, upon this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation, so conceived, and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met here on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of it as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But in a larger sense we can not dedicate—we can not consecrate—we can not hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our power to add or detract. The world will little note,

nor long remember, what we say here, but can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they have, thus far, so nobly carried on. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great tasks remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to the cause for which they here gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation shall have a new birth of freedom; and that this government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

Emergency Planning & Backup

When I originally wrote this column, there were several hurricanes that were a threat to Hawaii. Fortunately, they missed us, but the fact that we are vulnerable still makes this advice a must-do! After watching all the reports about Katrina, I began to think about emergency plans for a hit! I even bought a 12 pack of bottled water this morning on my regular commissary run! I have always said it's a waste of money since we have such good water out of the tap, here {-}

An anyhow, after all that I thought it might be a good idea to once again, cover that very important topic... backup! Are you really prepared for a loss of all your data? As we have discussed, there are many ways to keep the data you backup...depending on the size of your HD, you can use CDs, DVDs, tape, external HDs, internal HDs, flashdrives (they come as big as 2GB now) or even another PC. Speaking of another PC, if you have a laptop, that's probably the best place to put your backup as it's small enough to take with you should you have to evacuate...however, it's still a good idea to do a backup with one of the other media, too. Also, remember most backup programs don't allow you to restore your programs with the backup, you will need your CDs, so make sure you have them all together to take with you. As I have told you before, I use True Image from Acronis which DOES restore all the programs to my PC without having to use individual CDs. It might not restore your OS, however, due to MS' requirement to activate your copy of Windows, so be sure to take your Windows CD with you, too! Another interesting suggestion I saw recently, was to take your HD(s) with you. This of course entails opening your PC and disconnecting the cables to your HD(s) as well as unscrewing the four screws, 2 on each side of the HD(s) and sliding them out. The advantage of this, of course, is 2 fold. No backup needed...you have all your files, and if your PC was lost in a Hurricane and turned up somewhere in the hands of a hacker, there would be no access to your files! I realize, this is a pretty far-out scenario, but who knows {-}

OK, so you have all your supplies set to go, based on one of the many checklists available. How about your health records? What if your primary health care facility is destroyed? This seems to be a recurrent subject in regard to Katrina. One place you may want to check out is www.iHealthrecords.com where you can find forms to fill out with all your critical medical info to take with you...or, if you have an online e-mail account, just e-mail a copy to yourself and it will be available online. This also applies to many other documents you may have in a safe-deposit box. What if the bank gets zapped? Again, you can scan and copy the documents and attach them to an e-mail to your online e-mail address so they will be available online. There are also pay sites that let you keep info, like www.elderissues.com Another good site for forms to fill out is www.todaysseniors.com ...these are free, I believe. One other item, again, based on stories after Katrina, if you haven't scanned your photo albums and saved them, you should...many albums of pictures that are irreplaceable were lost to the flood waters. There are a number of websites where you can store photos...most are free: www.shutterfly.com www.kodakgallery.com and www.snapfish.com

Finally, if you (we) are lucky and the Hurricane spares our houses and computers and the electricity comes back on quickly, you might find that your broadband ISP, e.g. roadrunner may be out and stay that way for some time. So, I have a backup that should work for everyone and it's a free one. I have a Juno account that gives me internet dialup access for 10 hours a month. In a pinch, enough to download my e-mail for quite a few days. You can sign-up and download the software at www.juno.com.

That about covers the subject and should keep you busy for awhile. While you are at it, in case you are also interested in cleaning up some of the excess stuff on your HD, the following is a good way to do it:

REMOVE USELESS FILE TYPES

Here's a short list that covers the major files that you can lose without danger.

~.mp .bak .chk .cnt .fts .gid .grp .hlp .old .tmp

Just move them into a "Delete" folder. When you've run your computer without encountering any problems for a few days or weeks, it is probably safe to get rid of everything in the "Delete" folder. To find these files, go "Start / Find / Files and Folders"

Type in "*.####" (with ' .###' being the listed extension). Make sure you search your entire computer instead of just one folder. Also

.AVI & .WMV - movie files; unless you want to see them over and over or keep to forward to all your e-mail pals, you can save quite a bit of space by deleting them. After you are done with all this, you should run Windows defrag.

That's it for now, this time the Hurricanes passed us by, but don't count on it...get to work and backup!
